As the title indicates, it advocates changing language education through CALL. In many ways, of course, the entire educational process is one of advocacy. Teachers at any level and in any capacity have always been "experts" of their particular field of expertise. They profess their faith in the value of the material they teach and enthusiastically advocate mastery of the information they convey. This book advocates change that makes effective use of new research into learning styles as well as new technology in order to increase student learning. Many might feel that there has already been change enough in the last two decades or more. Certainly the computer has brought significant and sweeping changes to almost every aspect of people's lives, including education. This book is an attempt to clarify certain issues that seem to me to arise from adopting a communicative approach to the teaching of language. I have in mind, in particular, the teaching of English to speakers of other languages. So this book is not in any way intended as propaganda for a new "communicative" orthodoxy in language teaching. It is, on the contrary, an appeal for critical investigation into the bases of a belief and its practical implications. I am not trying to present a conclusive case but to start an inquiry. That is to say, we are generally called upon to produce instances of language use: we do not simply manifest the abstract system of the language, we at the same time realize it as meaningful communicative behaviour.
