These contradictory pressures are encapsulated in the phrase "squaring the welfare circle", which was also the sub-title of an earlier text on the British welfare state from "the Kent School" (George and Miller, 1994). The latter took a notably downbeat view of the social policy future in Britain, arguing that the Conservative reforms since 1979 had set in train a profound transformation from a liberal, collectivist to a residual, neo-liberal model of social welfare.
