He argues that the social sciences are about to be transformed by individual genetic data known as "polygenic scores" that will replace traditional IQ measures. Gender: The author explains some of the genetic and physiological differences between male and female sexes (and those qualifying as intersexual). Provides book-length treatment of the concept of human individuality in twentieth century scientific psychology, highlighting the historical contributions made by the German psychologist and philosopher William Stern (1871-1938). Critically appraises contemporary thinking about personality in light of historical and methodological considerations. Challenges readers to rethink the problem of The book turned out to be an under-taking on a still larger scale than the Krakow get-together.
