The first known use of it is by Sir Thomas More in A Treatyce upon the last thynges, circa 1535: In such wise yt not wtoute som note & reproch of suche vagaraunte mind, other folk sodainly say to them: a peny for your thought. (A rough paraphrase of the above is "when people notice that someone appears disengaged and wish them to rejoin the conversation they ask 'a penny for your thoughts'.") The expression became so well used that it was often shortened to 'a penny for them' or even ju (a penny for your thoughts definition: 1. said when you want to know what another person is thinking, usually because they have been quiet". The earliest written citation of the idiom "A penny for your thoughts" can be found in John Heywood's book "The Proverbs of John Heywood" which was first published in 1546. In that famous book you will also find classic idioms such as "Went in one ear and out the other", "No man ought to look a given horse in the mouth" and "Butter would not melt in her mouth".
