In Household and Family Characteristics: March 1994 (September 1995, <http://www.census.gov/prod/1/pop/p20-483.pdf>), Steve Rawlings and Arlene Saluter report numbers from 1970 and 1980, which here are compared with Fields's numbers from 2003. In 1970, 88.8% of white families were married-couple families, compared with 81.9% in 2003. In 1970, 15.3% of Hispanic family households and 27.9% of African-American family households were headed by single women, according to Rawlings and Saluter. By 2003, two million (22.3%) Hispanic family households and four million (44.8%) African-American family households were headed by single women. (See Table 2.6.) Living Arrangements of Children. It compares the most current data with that for households and families for earlier years, and examines some of the major changes in their characteristics and composition. Related Information. La PIP: This report summarizes some of the recent changes in the characteristics of US households and families, and presents detailed data on the subject from the March 1984 Current Population Survey. Changes of particular note are: 1) married couple families with children under 18 constituted about 29% of all households in 1984, substantially less than the 1970 level of 40%; 2) 1 parent family situations accounted for 26% of all family groups with children under 18 in 1984, compared with 22% in 1980, and 13% in 1970; 3) the proportion of woman. In 1984, household maintainers were a median age of 45.6 years, were most likely to be married, and were more likely to own their housing unit if they were a family rather than a nonfamily household.
