

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In my book *Emergence: Labeled Autistic* (Grandin & Scariano, 1986), I describe craving pressure stimulation. It was an approach-avoid situation. At various autism conferences, I have had 30 or 40 parents tell me that their autistic child seeks deep pressure stimuli. Research by Schopler (1965) indicated that autistic children prefer (proximal) sensory stimulation such as touching, tasting, and smelling to distal sensory stimulation such as hearing or seeing. back to menu.
