I bought this years ago and it sat on my shelf. We will now put it to use! I love learning what curriculum other homeschool families are using with their kids! Here's a peek into what I'm using with with my 1st grade son (and why)! Well, my little guy is actually an older 1st grader, and he began using Saxon K when he was 5 and in Pre-K. Saxon K is very gentle and I think perfect for preschool. So we worked through Saxon 1 in kindergarten, and are now ready to jump into Saxon 2 in 1st grade. It does move a bit faster than Saxon 1 and we may need to slow down to master addition and subtraction facts. But that's okay!
